Dear Deputy Secretary Miller;

This letter serves as an amendment and update to the Kansas level of state financial support for IDEA Part B, Students with Disabilities ages 3-21 for the FFY09 (2009-2010) fiscal year. During the past year, Kansas has communicated with the U.S. Department of Education and the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) regarding a Waiver Request for the FFY09 year which includes the following correspondence;

May 22, 2009 – Kansas submits a Waiver Request for FFY09
August 12, 2009 – Kansas submits Response to Questions – 8/05/09 conference call March 16, 2010 – Kansas receives Waiver Request Response March 24, 2010 – Kansas submits Waiver Appeal

In addition, on December 2, 2009, OSEP published Memorandum 10-5 to clarify the requirements for calculating state level financial support for IDEA Part B. This amendment is necessary to provide year-end rather than anticipated state appropriations for FFY09 and use calculations based on OSEP's 10-5 Memorandum posted on December 2, 2009.

Enclosed is the updated Kansas State Level of Financial Support, Part B IDEA Worksheet which outlines the finalized state appropriations and revised calculations for FFY08 and FFY09. In order to complete this worksheet, KSDE staff consisting of various teams within the agency, solicited other state agencies and gathered information regarding all financial support for students with disabilities ages 3-21 in Kansas along with the methodology used for generating the total amount of support. KSDE included in its calculation funds used in FFY08 and FFY09 to administer and supervise the IDEA Part B program. KSDE also deducted special education funds that supported either Gifted services as mandated in Kansas under IDEA Part B and any funds reimbursed to districts for providing Part C services.

Based on this revised calculation, the State of Kansas amends the FFY09 Waiver Request from \$60,212,507 to \$55,492,707.

The updated Kansas state level of financial support for students with disabilities in FFY08 was \$433,384,169 and in FFY09 was \$377,891,462. This is a difference of \$55,492,707 and reflects a decrease in fiscal support of 12.8%. The May 22, 2009 Waiver Request for FFY09, the August 12, 2009 Request to Questions, and the March 24, 2010 Waiver Appeal letters provide in detail the basis for this reduction which was the result of a precipitous and unforeseen decline in state fiscal resources.

On March 16, 2010, Kansas received a response on the FFY09 Waiver Request from the U.S. Department of Education. In this letter, Kansas was granted a partial waiver for FFY09 in the amount of \$44,486,326 which at the time was comparative to the percentage of reduction in the State General Fund between FFY08 to FFY09 of 10.4%.

Enclosed is the final State General Fund Appropriation for FFY09 by agency. While further cuts to the State General Fund were necessary during the FFY09 year to balance the State's budget, funding for special education was preserved from any additional cuts. By the end of FFY09, the final State General Fund was decreased by 12.3% below the final amount allocated in FFY08. Below is a chart comparing the State's level of financial support for special education to the State General Fund for years FFY08 and FFY09.

It is important to note as outlined below, Kansas Legislature substantially increased the State's appropriation for special education in recent years prior to the FFY09 recession. This increased special education funding was significantly above the percentage of increase in the State General Fund. Below is a chart comparing the annual appropriations allocated for distribution from KSDE for IDEA Part B to the State General Fund for years 2004-2005 through 2008-2009.

A concerted effort was made to minimize the reduction of special education state aid by utilizing the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) federal funds which together with state aid has resulted in only a 1% reduction in FFY09.

Overall, public education accounts for 65% of the total expenditures from the State General Fund. Elementary and secondary education accounts for 52% of the total expenditures while higher education accounts for the remaining 13%. Below is a chart which provides information on the KSDE approved budgets for FFY08 and FFY09 K-12 public education by program.

#### Kansas LEA – Meeting Local Effort Requirements

Nationally, Kansas has a unique history of funding education with state and local monies rather than federal dollars. According to the 2006 Public Education Finances published by the U.S. Census Bureau, (<a href="http://ftp2.census.gov/govs/school/06f33pub.pdf">http://ftp2.census.gov/govs/school/06f33pub.pdf</a>), the 2005-2006 per pupil expenditures in Kansas were \$9,973. Of this total, 93% was funded through a combination of State (57%) or LEA (36%) local funds. The remaining \$731 of expenditures (7.3%) was reported as federal funds. Only nine other states expend less federal funds per year for education.

With the steady increase of state special education funding over the past 5 years in Kansas, LEAs have demonstrated fiscal management by accruing cash reserve balances to be accessed in times of economic hardship. The LEA cash reserve balances as reported to KSDE since 2004-2005 for special education has increased as state funding increased during the same time period. The chart below shows the aggregate total for all LEA cash reserve balances since 2004-2005 through 2008-2009.

KSDE has fully integrated fiscal accountability into general supervision which is referred to as the Kansas Integrated Accountability System, KIAS. As a result, KSDE has provided technical assistance to LEAs on the requirements of 34 C.F.R. §300.202(a)(3) and 34 C.F.R. §300.203 which stipulate LEAs must supplement and not supplant state and local funds in using IDEA Part B federal funds and maintain local effort. Technical assistance on fiscal accountability is provided in a variety of ways specifically on meeting local maintenance of effort for FFY09 and includes dissemination of guidance documents, conference calls, individual LEA meetings with KSDE staff, and emails.

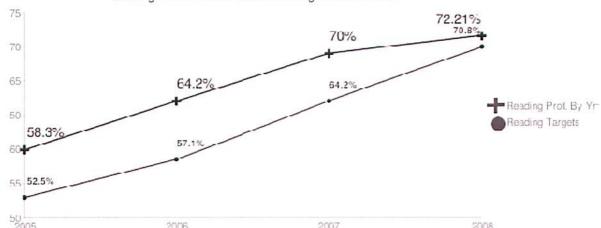
A Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) - Meeting the Requirements of IDEA Kansas continues to make an extraordinarily good faith effort to meet all IDEA requirements. As shown below, the number of special education teachers and paraeducators has increased significantly since FFY04 while the number of special education students has remained fairly constant.

It is important to note during this same time period appropriations for special education increased over \$177 million, or by 70.6%. As a result of these additional resources and the unwavering commitment of Kansas educators to ensure the academic success of all students, unprecedented gains in the academic performance of special education students and a narrowing of the gap between special education students and regular education students has occurred.

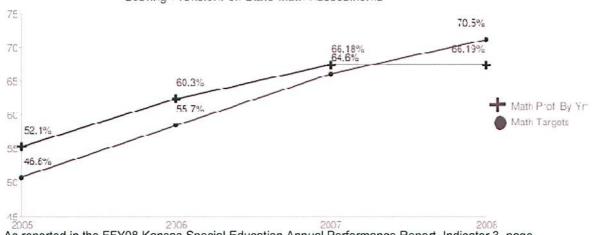

No budget reductions were applied to the Special Education Services Team in the State Department of Education in FFY09 to ensure that adequate staffing and resources continue to be available for monitoring school districts for compliance with IDEA and to provide required technical assistance, training, and support to schools. Based on the results of the Kansas Special Education State Performance Plan (SPP) and Special Education Annual Performance Report (APR), the most recent Level of Determination (LOD) made by the Office of Special Education Programs in June 2010 for the State of Kansas was "Meets Requirements".

FFY09 Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) data indicate improvement from FFY08 in the percentage of students with disabilities ages 6-21 served inside the regular class 80% or more

of the day from 62.16% to 62.8%. Special Education performance data for other SPP indicators for the 2009-2010 year is currently being collected and will be reported in the FF09 Special Education APR. Once again, Kansas anticipates meeting all IDEA requirements and demonstrating improved outcomes for students with disabilities.

KSDE appreciates the assistance of the U.S. Department of Education in reviewing this amended Waiver Request for FFY09. Despite this financial hardship, Kansas educators continue to ensure a free appropriate public education will be provided to all students with disabilities.

# Kansas State Level of Financial Support for Special Education - Maintenance of Effort (MOE) Part B IDEA (Students with Disabilities Ages 3-21)

#### State Level Financial Support for Special Education - Requirements and Guidance

Under 34 CFR §300.163(a), "a State must not reduce the amount of State financial support for special education and related services for children with disabilities, or otherwise made available because of the excess costs of educating those children, below the amount of that support for the preceding fiscal year."

Per guidance provided by the U.S Department of Education within the OSEP 10-5 Memorandum, "The reference to 'State Financial Support' in 34 CFR §300.163(a) is not limited to only the financial support provided to or through the SEA, but encompasses the financial support of all State agencies that provide or pay for special education and related services, as those terms are defined under IDEA, to children with disabilities"

34 CFR §300.162(b)(2)(1) "Funds paid to a State under this part must not be commingled with State funds. "

"The State financial support provided by the SEA for special education and related services is, of course, also included in the calculation required by 34 CFR §300.163." (OSEP 10-5 Memorandum)

"...a State needs to include in its calculation of 'State financial support for special education and related services' funds other agencies provide to the SEA for such services, funds other agencies provide directly to LEAs for the services, and funds other agencies directly pay to staff or contractors for the delivery of the services pursuant to an IEP."

34 CFR §300,163(b) "Reduction of funds for failure to maintain support. The Secretary reduces the allocation of funds under section 611 of the Act for any fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the State fails to comply with the requirement of paragraph (a) of this section by the same amount by which the State fails to meet the requirement."
