## Cross-walking the Visual Art Philosophical Foundations with the

## **Kansas Rose Capacities**

**Rose Standard Capacities:** Adopted by the Kansas Supreme Court in *Gannon v. Kansas*. The 2014 Legislature passed and the Governor signed HB 2506, which directs the Kansas State Board of Education to "design subjects and areas of instruction to achieve the goal established by the Legislature of providing every child with at least the following capacities" as listed below (see right column).

To represent how these capacities align to the Kansas Curricular Standards for the Visual Arts, a crosswalk has been designed to reveal how the capacities are fulfilled through the Philosophical Foundations and Lifelong Goals that are the basis for the revised Kansas Curricular Standards for the Visual Arts.
