SPECIAL EDUCATION FY 2022 – BUDGET

HISTORY -- Current law provides for 92% of excess cost.

2020-21	\$ 505.6 million	\$ 7,500,000
2021-22	\$ 512.9 million	\$ 7,500,000



SPECIAL EDUCATION Excess Cost Estimates

HISTORY – (KSA 72-3422) Current law provides for 92% of excess cost.

State Funding

Add \$7.5 million per year

2020-21 \$ 505.6 million (73.2%)
\$130 million to reach 92%

2021-22 \$512.9 million (68.7%)
\$173 million to reach 92%

KSBE Add \$20.8 million to slow
Recommend decline (72%)

SPECIAL EDUCATION Federal Funding Estimates

<u>Year</u>	<u>Amount</u>
2020-21	\$149.7 million (14.1%) \$276 million to reach 40%
2021-22	\$145.0 million (12.3%) \$326 million to reach 40%



CARES Act Special Education

ESSER-Special Education funds may only be used to provide additional special education and related services that are necessary to respond to the COVID-19 interruption.

\$8,030,231 = \$565 per FTE Teacher

Must be spent by September 30, 2022



CARES Act Special Education

Round Two ??

*Total = \$369.8 million
About 4 Times Round One*

*90% Distributed on Title 1 Formula
10% Directed by KSDE*

Must be spent by Sept. 30, 2023
