Pre-service programs and lack of student teachers in Early Childhood

Dr. Eva Horn– PowerPoint Presentation

- Not enough teachers in key shortage areas. Reasons include:
 - o Layoffs during the Great Recession
 - Growing student population but fewer people entering teacher prep programs (according to the Learning Policy Institute)

Kansas leads the world in the success of each student.

- o Salary or benefits lacking
- o High stress/high expectations
- In a typical cohort at KU, they were routinely around 20-25 entering the program. This year only 8 were admitted.
- Some programs across Kansas have already temporarily closed due to lack of students entering their program
- Discussion on current strategies being implemented to boost numbers at university programs. Looking at partnerships with high schools and universities, "grow your own" method.
- Discussion around avoiding burnout for new employees in this field of work.
- The Kansas Early Childhood Recommendations Panel is also a good place to review updates on this topic. They meet the third Friday of each month.

- Reviewed endorsement types
 - o Early childhood unified- birth to kindergarten, birth to 3rd grade

- o Elementary education unified- kindergarten to 6th (could change to include pre-k as well.
- Waivers and provisional licenses available, birth to grade 3.
- WSU TAP
 - o Allows individual to teach in early childhood unified birth to grade 3 position, and/or elementary education K-6th.
 - o Depending on education history, an individual can qualify for a TAP license while completing the program
- Briefly reviewed emergency sub licenses
 - o High school diploma
 - o 18 years old
 - o Offer of hire from the district

Annual Report

Bert Moore - PowerPoint Presentation

- Presentation showed to the Board of Education on the Annual SEAC report
- Discussed who SEAC memberships represent and whether they are nominated or applied for positions
 - o Majority Rule is that majority or members should be a person with a disability or have a child with a disability between and ages of birth and 26
 - 21 voting members and 14 members fit these criteria
- Discussed the topics we have discussed in meetings
 - o Personnel shortages, formation of memberships committee to review new member applications, navigating change document, secondary transition services and requirements (including a cub-committee), SPP/APR requirements, and Legislative session discussions
- Current work in progress:
 - o Administrative and teacher licensure
 - Transition
 - Supporting COVID related issues
 - o Technical Assistance availability and adaptability
 - o Graduation Requirement Task Force
- SEAC purpose and mission is to represent students with disabilities and their families.

Council Ex-Officio Member Updates

- Families Together -
 - October 1-December 31 Report
 - o 1,247 individual consultations and training
 - o More parents of kids receiving gifted services during this timeframe
 - o IEPs and Family Support were the top two categories in terms of contact content

- Not hearing from schools or DCF about kids that need an education advocate if they are homeless. Worried these kids might be getting missed in terms of this
- 29 early childhood appointments made during this timeframe as well.
 Shared this information during the last SICC meeting
- Kansas Association of Special Education Administrators (KASEA) Ashley Enz
 - o New president- Doug Anderson
 - o Winter conference coming up-February 22-23 in Topeka (virtual options available to attend as well)
 - Legislative priorities for KASEA this year include KPERS, school funding, and student and school safety
- Disability Rights Center Mike Burgess
 - HB 2122- in process of trying to move that forward. If any group is willing to support this effort with testimony or letters of support, it would be appreciated. Support of Decision-Making Agreements. Tried passing three years ago and last year, but died on general orders.
