Personnel Categorical Aid (KGRS)

- If someone does not see KGRS as approved in their applications, it's a helpdesk@ksde.org problem
- If someone has access to KGRS but can't access PCA, I can help (ealden@ksde.org)
 - I have instructions in an email for superintendents and other administrators that don't remember how to approve people

Categorical Aid Reminders

- October 2nd–Final day to enter/update before the first payment.
 - The first payment pays on FTE that is claimed.
 - If you don't claim any FTE, you will receive no funds.
 - Deadlines are in Appendix A of the Reimbursement Guide, in the KIAS calendar, and separately here: https://www.ksde.org/Portals/0/SES/funding/CatAid/CatAid-Deadlines.pdf

- Kansas elementary schools partner with parents and caregivers to complete both the Ages & Stages Questionnaires®, Third Edition (ASQ-3), and the Ages & Stages Questionnaires®: Social-Emotional, Second Edition (ASQ:SE-2).
 - All accredited schools must administer the ASQ to incoming kindergarten students by Sept. 20, 2023. All data must be entered into ASQ Online by Oct. 10, 2023.


Entering data into KIAS...

This is correct with the understanding:

- District has the proper PWN
- District has conducted the evaluation and conducted an evaluation determination meeting to determine eligibility.

After the IEP date is entered, the system determines if the IEP is after the 3rd birthday.

- If IEP date is on or before the 3rd birthday, the data entry is over and this referral is potentially compliant.
- If IEP date is after the 3rd birthday, the user must supply a reason it was delayed. Federal Exceptions are potentially compliant. If the user selects Self reported non compliance, the referral is potentially non compliant.




Entering data into KIAS...

Scenario: District has proper PWN, evaluation was conducted, district conducted an evaluation determination meeting and the result of the eligibility determination was that the child was Not Eligible.


This Example is **INCORRECT** IF:

- District answers **No** to "was eligibility determined" however the reason selected was "Other" and district enters: Child did not qualify.
- The user should have select **YES** Eligibility was determined and that the child was not eligible.



Meeting Compliance Status

- A district should select Eligibility Determined NO when:
- One of the Federal exceptions apply prior to the eligibility determination meeting (first two reasons on the list). The district may also have determined an evaluation was not needed.
- We can not foresee all circumstances, therefore we have an "Other" for the district to use and we (KSDE) review those other reasons. Other can not be used when the "child did not qualify".





Meeting Compliance Status

- Expectation: All children referred by Part C prior to age 3, who are found eligible for Part B, have an IEP developed and implemented by their third birthday.
 - "Family cancels at the last minute and you can't reschedule because it's too close to child's birthday" <u>is not</u> a Federal exception.
 - Using the 60 school day evaluation timeline to go beyond the 3rd birthday is **not** allowed.
- There are only two allowable exceptions for this indicator: (1) The parent's repeated refusal to make the child available for an evaluation; or (2) the child moved out of the district before completion of the child's evaluation to determine initial eligibility for Part B.

State Performance Plan: Indicator 11

"Percent of children who were evaluated within 60 days of receiving parental consent for initial evaluation or, if the State established a timeframe within which the evaluation must be conducted, within that timeframe."

Kansas has established a **60 school day** timeline (K.A.R 91-40-8(f).



Exceptions to the Timeline

- 1. The parent of the child repeatedly fails or refuses to produce the child for the evaluation.
- 2. If a child enrolls in a new district after the evaluation has begun and before the determination of eligibility, however, the new district is required to make sufficient progress to ensure a prompt completion of the evaluation, and the parent and school district must agree to a specific timeline for completion.
- 3. If a parent agrees in writing to extend the timeline. This written extension should also include the date of when the initial evaluation will be completed.



Use the exceptions wisely!

- When a district applies one of the exceptions for not meeting the 60 school day timeframe, the district must submit documentation to KSDE through the KIAS web application.
- The documentation is then reviewed by Indicator 11 team to determine if the exception was used appropriately.
- The exceptions may only be used within the timeframe of the initial evaluation that is occurring.



Helpful Hints

- Designate someone in district to track the number of school days of the initial evaluations that are occurring and provide reminders.
- Shorten the number of days for the initial evaluations to be completed by the respective evaluators.
- Schedule Initial Evaluation eligibility meeting well in advance of the 60 day school deadline.



Helpful Hints



- When calculating the number of school days, use the most up to date district calendar that reflects any changes that may have occurred within the school year.

Pre-Employment Transition Services

Pre-Employment Transition Services are available to individuals

- who meet the definition of a student with a disability,
- ages 14 through 21,
- who may need such services,
- are enrolled in a secondary, postsecondary, or other recognized education program,
- and are eligible for vocational rehabilitation (VR) services, or potentially eligible for vocational rehabilitation services (i.e., all students with disabilities, including those who have not applied or been determined eligible for VR services); and are:
- Eligible for and receiving special education services through an Individualized Education Program (IEP)
- Receiving services under a Section 504 Accommodation Plan
- Not currently receiving services; but, eligible for the purposes of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act



What is the Process?

Students begin working with Pre-ETS Transition Specialist once there is a signed Pre-Employment Transition Services Request for Services and Information Release.

Throughout the school year, the Pre-ETS Specialist will provide or arrange for the provision of one or more of the following five required Pre-ETS services individually or in a group setting:

- 1. Job exploration counseling
- 2. Work-based learning experiences
- 3. Counseling on opportunities for enrollment in comprehensive transition or post-secondary educational programs at post-secondary institutions of higher education
- 4. Workplace readiness training, to develop social skills and independent living
- 5. Instruction in self-advocacy, which may include peer mentoring



Pre-Employment Transition Services Annual Planning Guide

The Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) Annual Planning Guide and Partnership is an instrument to help educators and Pre-ETS Transition Specialists meet the transition requirements identified in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). while providing meaningful and effective transition services to students with disabilities.

This document will serve as a tool to develop a written working document between Pre-ETS and the schools; and, help to:

- Promote a coordinated effort between the school district and the local Pre-ETS Transition Specialist.
- Implement strategies that will facilitate effective transition services, eliminate duplication of services; and,
- Ensure the development of an effective partnership to provide vital and results-oriented services to transition-aged students with disabilities.



Pre-ETS Transition Specialists Role

- Work in collaboration with schools to complete the **Pre-ETS Annual Planning Partnership Guide.** This will help to identify the nature and scope of services provided by each entity so students with disabilities receive the services to which they are entitled and need.
- Primary role is helping students to identify career interests. Services supplement those provided by the school and do not duplicate those services.
- The Pre-ETS Transition Specialists will be scheduling meetings with the schools to complete the Planning Guide and Partnership.



Pre-ETS

- A Pre-ETS Request for Services and Information Release is completed and submitted to the Pre-ETS Transition Specialist. An appointment will be scheduled at the earliest possible time to start services. A parent's or legal representatives/guardian's consent is required for students under the age of 18, or not their own guardian.
- At the end of each school year, a *satisfaction survey* will be distributed to all school contacts who serve students with disabilities. Pre-ETS Transition Specialists will send the survey link to each of their school contacts. Because school feedback is critical to continuous improvement, the expectation is to receive at least one survey response from each school. A response from each contact is preferred.



Eligibility Vocational Rehabilitation Services

- VR provides services for Kansans with disabilities to obtain, maintain or regain employment in the competitive and integrated workplace.
- To be eligible for services, a person must have a physical or mental disability which results in a substantial impediment to employment, and he or she must require VR services in order to get a job.
- Services are provided by VR counselors stationed in DCF offices and in partnership with private contractors and service providers.
- Services are individualized according to each person's rehabilitation needs and employment objective. Services may include counseling and guidance, training, job coaching, assistive technology, physical/mental restoration services and job placement.
- If a student is working with Pre-ETS, it doesn't automatically mean that someone will be eligible for VR services.




Pre-ETS Contact Information

- There is a Pre-ETS Transition Specialist and VR counselor assigned to each school district. Each of the individuals can sit down to explain Pre-ETS and VR services. Pre-ETS and VR services are Vocational Rehabilitation



 - 3 video observation cycles with your mentor (including pre-observation conversation, shared video of practice, and a post observation conversation
 - Complete one exploration (during either year one of year two)
 - Improving Self-Regulation to Support Student Success
 - Developing IEPs
 - Working with Paraprofessionals
 - Accommodations & Modifications



RESULTS & IMPACT

- During the past 5 years, early career special educators in 137 districts or related organizations in Kansas have been impacted by Kansas Early Career Special Educator Mentoring.
- 78% of mentees continue teaching in Kansas 5 years after participating in mentoring.
- On average, 89% of mentees meet weekly participation expectations.
- The most significant area of improvement compared from the beginning of the year to the end of year is in planning instruction based on the learning and developmental levels of all students.
- 96% of mentees indicated they applied what they learned in the Exploration to their professional practice.



PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE:

LEAs have 27 months to obligate allocated IDEA funds.

- FFY (SFY) 21-22 funds are set to expire as of September 30, 2023.
- LEAs with balances
 - Emails sent to LEAs that have expiring funds.
 - LEAs must notify KSDE of the obligation for funds.

LIQUIDATION PERIOD:

LEAs must liquidate all obligations (i.e., pay outstanding debts) within 90 days of the performance period's end.

This deadline is December 31, 2023, 30 months after the funds were made available.

Unused funds are returned to the U.S. Department of Education

PURPOSE:

States must ensure fiscal accountability in the local education agency's (LEA) management of federal funds.
