

Introduction

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This publication has been prepared by the School Finance team of the Kansas Department of Education to provide enrollment information for each of the unified school districts in Kansas. The data has been compiled from the Superintendent's Organization Reports (SO66) and the Principal's Building Reports (PBR) and is not audited. Headcount on this report includes students enrolled in the Kansas Academy of Math & Science (KAMS) at Fort Hays State University and all virtual students; the report excludes students receiving services at a Juvenile Detention Center (JDC).

This report will be beneficial to school boards, school administrators, and others who may be interested in the educational programs of local public-school districts.
